Re: Police Department Monthly Report for September '14

Monthly Summary

Patrol Summary: The month of September saw a slight increase in calls for service. In total the police department answered 812 calls for service, of which 310 were traffic stops; we took 121 case reports and made 87 arrests. At this point we are through the third quarter of 2014 and are seeing similar numbers to what was experienced last year. Overall there has been a small decrease in calls for service and cases made but an increase in arrests made. A complete listing of comparison crime data between 2013 & 2014 is attached for your review.

Points of interest from Patrol this month:

Proactive traffic enforcement continues to pay off. A traffic stop for a minor equipment violation this month illustrated how traffic enforcement not only makes the roadways safer, it often yields additional criminal interdiction. On September 12th a patrol officer stopped a vehicle for a faulty brake light. When officers checked this individual through their in-car computers, they found that he had five warrants out for his arrest. These warrants were for kidnapping, burglary, domestic assault, probation violation, and driving while license revoked. This traffic stop for a minor equipment violation ended up in the apprehension of a fugitive from justice who was wanted on very serious charges. Additionally, upon further investigation, it was found that a passenger in the vehicle was in possession of illegal narcotics.

Another service our patrol officers offer to this city that isn't discussed often is animal control. Officers were called to an aggressive dog that was threatening passing pedestrians. When officers arrived, they found a pit bull that had escaped from a residence. The dog was acting very aggressively and charged at responding officers. The officers would have been justified in utilizing deadly force to put the dog down. However, the decision was made to attempt an apprehension with a Taser and a catch pole. This attempt was successful and the dog was apprehended with no lasting injuries to the officers or dog. The animal was then declared potentially vicious and turned over to Polk County Animal Control for housing due to its temperament.

Canine (K-9) Unit

Officer Canada and K9 Argos had 9 deployments in the month of September. Six deployments were narcotics related. Officer Canada and K9 Argos also had two deployments searching for fleeing criminals and one K9 demonstration.

On September 6th Officer Canada and K9 Argos performed a K9 demonstration for the Des Moines K9 Kennel Club and Dog Show at the Iowa State Fairgrounds. Officer Canada and K9 Argos showcased some of the various skills the team trains for on a daily basis and helped educate the public about the great benefits of having a dual purpose, certified police K9.

On September 25, 2014 Officer Canada and K9 Argos assisted Johnston and Urbandale Police with four suspects who were involved in a robbery/home invasion. The suspects fled in a vehicle and crashed in Urbandale. All four suspects fled on foot and were reported to be armed with handguns and rifles. Officer Canada and K9 Argos quickly picked up the track at the crash scene and began pursuing the suspects. K9 Argos and his handler jumped several fences and went through many darkened residential yards. Along the way Argos located articles of clothing that had been left behind by the suspects (suspects do this to alter their appearance from the original reported descriptions) and tracked the suspects for over one mile. Officer Canada and K9 Argos were less than two blocks away from the suspects when an officer on the perimeter located one of the suspects being tracked by Argos.

Officer Canada and K9 Argos were crucial in this apprehension. The success of this track enabled Officer Canada to update supporting officers in the area who were establishing a mobile security perimeter based upon the direction the suspects were going as determined by our canine unit. This directly led officers on the perimeter to apprehending a felony suspect as he fled from our K-9 team who was just steps behind him.

Investigations Summary: In September investigators were assigned 6 new cases for investigation, 3 cases were cleared by arrest, 1 case became inactive, 1 case was cleared exceptionally, and 0 cases were unfounded. Investigators also made 4 arrests, issued 0 arrest warrants, wrote 1 search warrant, and issued 0 subpoenas. Presently there are 11 open cases that investigators are actively carrying over for further follow up into the next month.

Notable cases for investigators in September focused on the investigation of a theft of money case, unauthorized use of a credit card case, and a death investigation. In each of these cases, investigators worked to a resolution through cooperation with area law enforcement, the issuance of court orders and/or the arrest(s) of those responsible.

In the first part of September, Detective Pearson continued working on a case from the month previous where a local business received 'charge backs' from a credit card company. The business reported this information to police and Detective Pearson began looking into the unauthorized use of a credit card where the individual requested goods and services. After receiving the necessary information from the witnesses involved, Detective Pearson arrested an individual for unauthorized use of a credit card over \$1k and Theft 5th for stealing services and food.

Investigators were asked to look into a case in September where an individual had their vehicle serviced and discovered their coin bag to be missing. The victim's coin bag in this incident contained over two hundred dollars in change. Detective Pearson was able to speak with the victim in this case to determine when the crime occurred. Ultimately, Detective Pearson was able to view the crime occurring on video, determine the location where the money was deposited and recover a receipt from the individual who committed the crime. This individual was charged with Theft 3rd.

Another property crime worked in the month of September by Detective Pearson was a report of items being stolen from a motor vehicle. The initial information on this case was vague and didn't afford investigators definitive means for an investigative lead. Through perseverance, Detective Pearson spoke to those associated with the incident or who may have knowledge of it and recovered one item reported stolen and a handgun - both recovered at the victim's residence. There were no charges filed in this case and no offender was identified.

Towards the end of September investigators were called in to conduct a death investigation for a male gun-shot victim. Patrol had responded to a location where it was reported that a male was shot and was deceased. Investigators processed the scene and collected information to aid them in determining the circumstances surrounding this incident. Investigators obtained a search warrant and executed it resulting in further information collected. Investigators received the medical examiner's findings and are currently awaiting further analysis and a comprehensive review of the items in this case. Investigators determined this case to be an isolated incident and have no indication for public concern.

The cases managed by the Investigation section are those that go beyond the typical resources and timeframes available for officers assigned to the Patrol Division. These cases are difficult to solve, often require coordination with outside organizations or jurisdictions, and many times involve additional subpoenas, search warrants, surveillance, or technical expertise (examples would be burglaries, identity thefts, fraud/forgery, sexual assaults, serious crimes against persons, death investigations, etc.). Cases that result in a status of suspended have been reviewed and investigated where neither identifiable suspect(s) nor probable cause exists for an arrest.

Additionally, multiple times a month, investigators from the Windsor Heights Police Department collaborate with neighboring jurisdictions to reduce criminal intentions through the use of technology and meetings and also share intelligence information.

Training Summary: In the months of September and October, in-service trainings are being split between firearms night qualifications and precision driving. Two groups of officers will alternate training topics so all officers are covered by four training dates. On September 3rd officers attended night fire training and handgun nighttime qualifications at the Des Moines Police Department's indoor shooting range. Firearms Instructor Pearson conducted low light training drills that focused on the officers' ability to utilize their sidearm in low light and no-light situations. This training is crucial as many officers work their shifts in the dark or encounter situations in darkened structures/environments.

On September 24th officers participated in precision driving training at the DMACC Driver Training Center. Driving Instructor Meyer conducted this training. Precision driving encompasses all police driving skills from low speed backing and parking to high speed response and vehicle pursuits. This training is also very important as patrol officers spend most of their time behind the wheel.



Officer Metzger spent September 18th completing her recertification as a firearms instructor. This training is required every few years and updates instructors on new teaching techniques and emerging trends in the realm of firearms instruction.

Lt. Meyer and Detective Pearson traveled to Blackhawk County to attend an advanced crime scene processing school put on by the International Association of Identification (IAI), Iowa Chapter. This class ran from September 22nd - 26th. Topics included investigative skills involving crime scene processing and photographing, blood spatter analysis, and firearms related crime scenes. These skills are invaluable and necessary to properly preserve and document a crime scene. See photos below.

Officers Metzger and Hill are the department's evidence technicians. They took part in an evidence management course that was hosted by the West Des Moines Police Department in September. The training covered evidence and property management which is a high liability area in law enforcement. The training focused on policies, procedures, packaging and storage of evidence. It also covered management concepts, audits and inventories, as well as security concepts, purging and dispositions, and property room layouts. Specific items covered in more extensive detail were handling of drugs, guns, and currency.

Lieutenants Meyer and Kendig attended a training held at the West Des Moines Police Department that covered the use of social media by law enforcement agencies. The facilitator was from the Kansas City Missouri Police Department. The training explained why social media is such a large part of everyday life now and how law enforcement agencies can best utilize social media to put out information and facilitate community outreach.

Chief McDaniel attended the Iowa Police Chief's Association's annual fall training conference in Council Bluffs September 23rd & 24th. This year's event involved case studies on how to manage child abductions, presentations on special event planning and incident command, and several membership and subcommittee meetings. It is a rare opportunity for police chiefs from across the state to get together and share ideas and issues that they are challenged with on a daily basis.

Reserve Program: Applicants completed the physical agility testing on September 5th. Applicant backgrounds will be conducted next.

Community Outreach Summary: Community awareness and services for the TCSC focused around 2 different events in the month of September. Traffic & Community Safety Coordinator Officer Amanda Woods was involved with 5 hours of outreach to the public. As the Department strives to partner with the community to provide education and service, Officer Woods worked with the Safe Kids of Iowa, Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau, Special Olympics of Iowa and the Community Education Council. Additionally, Officer Woods assisted with criminal investigations and further facilitated events during planning meetings.

In September, Officer Woods began the Code 411 curriculum with the West Des Moines School District for 6th grade students at Clive Elementary. Code 411 is a specific program that was created in 2006 by the West Des Moines Community School District to educate our young population on relevant social issues such as: internet safety, over-the-counter medicine abuse, drug resistance, and more. Three classes with a total of sixty-eight students will be empowered with information over a span of eight weeks to help them make sound choices in the future.

The Windsor Heights Police Department is a strong supporter of the Special Olympics here in Iowa. Officer Woods has been very committed to the betterment of this program and was afforded an opportunity, on behalf of the Special Olympics of Iowa, to attend the Law Enforcement Torch Run's annual international conference held in New Orleans, LA this year. This experience offered a rare opportunity to network with law enforcement partners and athletes from around the world sharing a common goal of giving back to our special needs communities.



Break-out sessions she attended included: athlete/family panels, best practices sessions, fundraising case studies, the "Flame of Hope" torch run, and participation in unified sports with several athletes.

Locally, officers participated in a fundraiser at Buffalo Wild Wings called 'Tip a Cop'. If you missed it, officers were on hand to wait on you with 10% of the proceeds going straight to the Special Olympics.

Is your child in the right seat? In September, the TCSC wanted to make sure. With the partnership of Safe Kids of Iowa, Officer Woods facilitated a car seat installation and inspection event. Both Officer Woods and Firefighter Lt. Tim Kurth worked with Hy-Vee to host this event on September 19. Although only three vehicles attended and four seats were inspected, we are hopeful that the event's advertisement and awareness did not go without notice. The TCSC promoted this event through Nixle, Facebook, at the PD, and through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration website.



Officer Woods participated in an orientation and roles/responsibilities conference with the Clive Elementary staff this month. She had the opportunity to reaffirm the Department's community and education and childhood involvement for the upcoming school year.

The Community Education Council met in September to make progress with this year's initiative of collecting data from our communities to determine future programming needs and wants. It is the hope of the committee members to utilize this information to create and forward necessary and desired information and events to the public.

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Officer Woods continued to work with Detective Pearson in September as an assisting investigator and back-up partner to the Investigations section. A primary function for an investigator is to speak with individuals, in-person, about their role in a situation. An inherent risk to these encounters is the single officer role. To mitigate this deficiency and maximize our investigative efforts, Support Services has partnered investigators together in these situations and we have seen an increase in case clearance rates by 40%. This has been an effective partnership as a stop-gap until additional staff can be added.

The TCSC disseminated reliable and relevant information to the public: she distributed 24 social media messages in the month of September. Officer Woods was not needed to supplement patrol staffing in the month of September.

Automated Traffic Enforcement: The Automatic Traffic Enforcement program continued with its mobile deployments targeting flagrant violators on our roadways (speeders >11mph over the posted speed limit). The intent of this program is to change driver behavior. The TCSC deployed automated enforcement equipment 689 hours in the month of September. There were 452 citations issued with 1 violation being rejected during final processing.

There were 8 citations contested and 3 citations brought before an administrative review hearing. The administrative review board determined 7 citations to be liable, 1 was found not liable and 0

were listed as an 'other' status. An 'other' status is a typical result of a party first contesting a citation but then choosing to pay it prior to the administrative review hearing.

An ATE software and processing center transition began towards the end of this month. The department's vendor (Gatso USA) has brought the daily task of event processing in-house, whereas before they were using a third party vendor. Once the new software is up and running and the processing center change-over fully occurs, we anticipate with this change a quicker processing time for violations from capture to the time a citation is issued. Our goal is to shrink the duration of time a vehicle owner has to wait to receive notice of their violation - effectively giving quicker notice and ideally changing driver behavior that much sooner.

Other News: As a result of our department winning the Fight for Air Climb sponsored by the American Lung Association earlier this year, the members of the winning team were invited to be a part of the promotional materials for next year's challenge. Attached is some of the media they are utilizing. You may see it being distributed as the event draws near. We hope to go back and defend the traveling trophy on March 22, 2015!
