A Letter From Mayor Mike Jones

Neighbors,

Wishing you a happy new year! 2022 was a busy year for the City and I wanted to highlight some accomplishments of elected officials and staff. The University Avenue Redesign was brought to substantial completion, we had our first annual Fall Festival, an expanded Windsor Wonderland, passed a 24/7 clean energy resolution, welcomed ALDI to the neighborhoodand as part of our



strategic visioning process with Drake University, distributed the first citywide survey in nearly five years. This year will be about building. There will be a total of eight street projects undertaken in 2023 including work on 68th Street, Colby, Jefferson, Wilshire, Crocker, Mariner and Sunset Terrace. Most importantly, our goal is for construction to begin on phase one of the \$12+ million reconstruction of 73rd Street between Hickman Road and University Avenue. Work on Colby Park will also begin, with plans for tennis court, parking and accessibility improvements.

We continue to work on a number of outdated and areas of need including improvements to our zoning code, website and code enforcement, which we know is of priority to a number of residents. The previously mentioned citywide survey gave us clear ideas on what residents are asking the City to focus on and we'll be discussing that in upcoming newsletters. As always, we are here to serve you and if you have any questions do not hesitate to reach out to me or a City Council member. I wish you a healthy and happy 2023!

A giant thank you and congratulations to Public Safety Director Chad McCluskey, who will sadly be leaving us as he has been appointed Chief of Police in Waukee. His last day will be January 12, 2023.



Strategic Vision Survey Helps Guide City Planning



Planning of 2024 City Budget Begins

City staff will begin work on preparing the 2024 City Budget in January. The budget outlines a spending plan for the next fiscal year starting July 1.

Register Between
January 1 - March 31

Spayed/Neutered - \$20

Unfixed - \$30

Fee Doubles After March 31





The time to register your pets for 2023 is coming up. All pet owners must register their animals between January 1 through March 31. A copy of your pet's current rabies certificate is required for a new or renewal license.

The fee for a neutered animals is \$20.

The fee for a non-neutered animals is \$30.

Search Begins for New City Administrator

City Administrator Dennis Durham left Windsor Heights on December 2 leaving a vacancy that Finance Director Rachelle Swisher has temporarily stepped into as Interim City Administrator.

At the December 5 City Council meeting the council approved a proposal from Municipal Solutions, LLC. to conduct an administrator search on behalf of the City. Municipal Solutions has over 300 successful local government executives searches in 17 years and will be performing a 90-day recruitment process with the following steps.

- 1. Needs assessment interviews with council and city staff
- 2. Job profile and recruitment
- Candidate screening
- 4. Candidate selection and screening
- 5. Transition and on-boarding assistance

When temperatures drop, the risk of your pipes freezing jumps. That's because water expands as it freezes and this expansion can break metal or plastic pipes. This could cause thousands of dollars in property damage. But here are some simple steps from the Red Cross to prevent this problem:

- Keep garage doors closed.
- Open kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors.
- Let cold water drip from a faucet.
- Keep the thermostat set to the same temperature during the day and night.
- If you are out of town, keep the heat set to no lower than 55 degrees.
- Add insulation to basements, attics, and crawl spaces.
