A Letter From Mayor Mike Jones

Happy New Year! Looking back on 2023, there was plenty to be joyous about. City Council approved multi-milliondollar improvements to Colby Park, which addressed ADA accessibility to the Community Center and also included a splash pad and playground refresh. There was the development of the long-vacant lot at 63rd Street and Hickman Road by Silverstar Car Wash, with the expectation for more construction in the surrounding lots. The Community Events Committee saw tremendous turnout for Movies in the Park, Fall Festival, and Windsor Wonderland, among other events.



Looking forward to 2024, the focus will be maintaining the same levels of service without raising property taxes, as the majority of the Iowa Legislature continues in their efforts to erode home rule and interfere with municipalities' ability to govern. There will be funding challenges with DART, an organization that our elected officials see as extremely important and want to see it continue to provide excellent service to our residents and neighbors across the Metro who shop at our businesses. There will be groundbreaking on The Windsor, a 100+ unit apartment complex at the intersection of 63rd Street and University. Perhaps most importantly to you, the 73rd Street Reconstruction Project will finally go out to bid in March, with the expectation for work to begin as soon as practical.

Your elected officials and staff are committed to providing you with outstanding services. There are several benefits available to Windsor Heights residents including the Metro Home Improvement Program, a residential property tax abatement, the Stormwater Best Management Reimbursement Program, and the Sidewalk Improvement Grants, which will help you pay for the cost of repairing existing sidewalks, as opposed to being specially assessed. Windsor Heights Recycles!

To encourage residents to recycle Mercury containing compact fluorescent bulbs, fluorescent tubes and HIDs bulbs Windsor Heights City Hall will be hosting a drop off location for residents. MetroWaste accepts halogen, incandescent and LED light bulbs in your trash but these can also be brought to City Hall for recycling as well.

How to drop-off: Bring your ID showing Windsor Heights residency and drop off up to fifteen intact eligible lightbulbs to City Hall weekdays between 8-4:30 and we'll recycle them for you at no charge. Light bulbs can also be brought to Bondurant Metro Waste at no charge.



Save Money While Using Less Salt

Deicing salt can be a valuable tool to keep us safe in the winter. However, a bag of salt ends up costing a lot more than \$10. Salt is corrosive, you may have noticed that from the rust on your car or pitted concrete. Salt damages not only vehicles, but buildings, sidewalks, plants and more. Salt can impact infrastructure like bridges and streetlights. Salt damage is not limited to the outdoors, it gets tracked into buildings and damages carpets and floors. Every ton of salt applied can create \$1,700 to \$17,000 of infrastructure damage, a Minnesota Pollution Control Agency report found. How much salt do you use?

Winter maintenance professionals work hard to keep us safe. Give plows time and space to do their jobs. Plows must drive slowly to ensure the applied salt doesn't bounce off the road. Don't expect winter roads to be 100% clear and perfect. We are all trying to be responsible salt users.

The use of salt to keep us safe can feel inevitable. Make sure to shovel early and often after snow falls to prevent ice and reduce your use of salt. Salt is a pollutant that stays in our local water forever. Future generations will be paying the price for the salt we put down today.

Stay tuned for next month's article on how to reduce the use of salt by fixing the infrastructure problems around you that cause ice to form, also known as low salt design.


DMPL removes late fines from most items

Beginning Tuesday, January 16, 2024, the Des Moines Public Library will no longer charge late fines for books, DVDs, CDs, and more materials. This policy, approved by the Des Moines Public Library Board of Trustees on Tuesday, December 19, will also retroactively eliminate all past late fines on library accounts. At that time, patrons whose library cards have been blocked due to past unpaid late fines will be able to renew their library cards
