The City of Windsor Heights is funding a Right of Way (ROW) Tree Planting Program to help increase the urban canopy and replace trees lost over the past several years due to emerald ash borer infestations and windstorms. Trees Forever will plant trees in the Fall of 2024 and will water and warranty them for the first year. Thereafter, residents are encouraged to help care for the tree and will be responsible for maintaining an eight-foot clearance above any sidewalks. The City will be responsible for any tree removal or trimming to maintain road clearance.

The availability of trees through this program is limited. Planting locations will be considered based on the order applications are received from residents and with selection subject to the proposed location meeting the attached ROW Tree Planting Guidelines. Upon receipt of an application, a city employee will visit the property to review the suitability of the proposed planting location per city guidelines. If the location is viable, city staff will place a white flag at the proposed planting location. If there is not a suitable location identified, a city employee will reach to the resident to discuss alternatives.

Registration opens Monday, July 8 at 1 PM. Scan the QR code and bookmark the registration page.



Keep Your Home Safe While You're Away

Did you know that you can request a vacation house check from the Windsor Heights Police Department? Well, if you didn't know, you can!

Visit the City's website windsorheights.org and search for the vacation house watch (or scan the QR Code). Input your information and submit it.

While we're are talking vacation houses, below are some great crime prevention tips that can help your home become a less desirable target for burglary.

- Check out your residence. Look around the exterior for ways a person could gain entry into your home, sliding glass doors, window air conditioners that could be removed, etc.
- Lock your doors and windows!
- Don't hide a key. Instead try giving a spare key to a trusted neighbor or family member. Ask if they can also periodically check on your house while you are gone.
- Consider leaving the lights or the radio on a timer while you're away to give the illusion that someone is there.
- Lock your vehicles if parked outside, especially if you have a garage door opener inside your car or truck.
- Try to keep valuables out of sight. If possible, throw away or recycle boxes from electronic or big item
 purchases yourself. Leaving them on the curb is advertising to would-be burglars. Secure jewelry, cash,
 and other valuables in a safe deposit box.
- Take photos of your furniture, valuables, and the rooms in your house. Also, take pictures of the serial and model numbers of high dollar electronics, bicycles, and other equipment. This can help identify items in the event of theft or damage.
- Don't advertise that you are gone. Stop the mail and newspapers. Plan for yard work (e.g., mowing and snow removal). Wait to post pictures of your vacation on social media until you arrive back.

They'll be back in August for the section of Walnut Creek between 73rd Street and Clive.







Tree of Heaven is Invading and What You Can Do

The tree of heaven (Ailanthus altissima), also known as Chinese sumac, copal-tree, stink tree, and varnish tree, is a problematic exotic invasive species in Iowa. It is often confused with sumac; however, the tree of heaven can be distinguished by the foul odor it emits.

Tree of heaven produces many seeds, grows extremely quickly, and can out-compete native plants. It can rapidly take over a site and form dense thickets. Tree of heaven is also known to produce allelochemicals that prevent other plants from growing around it.

The prefered way to treat tree of heaven is to basal-bark treat it before cutting it down in order to fully kill the tree. If you cut it and don't treat it, a lot of times the trees send out suckers and don't die fully.

For basal barking, the Polk County Conservation recommends two different approaches:

- A product called Pathfinder II (ready to use) you can buy it off Amazon or some forestry suppliers
- A mix of Triclopyr 4 (a.k.a. Element4/Garlon 4) and bark oil (a surfactant gets it to stick to the bark). Use
 3 gallons of bark oil with 1 gallon of herbicide.

The best window for basal-barking is July 1 until onset of fall color.

A cut-stump treatment (cut tree down and apply to remaining stump) of 50% glyphosate can be utilized, but you may be dealing with suckers and have to repeatedly treat over a few years. Either cut suckers of foliar spray with glyphosate.

6/3/24 City Council Meeting Recap

- Approved Resolution No. 2024-40 A Resolution Approving the Site Plan for The Windsor at 1148 63rd Street. At the meeting, Council added a condition of a privacy fence along the south side of the property and a temporary full access driveway on University Ave that will be reviewed by the City in three years
- Approved Resolution No. 2024-39 -A Resolution Approving Development Agreement with Windsor Millang, L.L.C., the Windsor, L.L.C. and Jensfam, LLC, Authorizing Annual Appropriation Tax Increment Payments and Pledging Certain Tax Increment Revenues to the Payment of the Agreement
- Approved contract With Wright Tree Service For Debris Removal of Debris Collected by the City after the May Storm
- Approved Payment to JC Midwest Services For Storm Cleanup Services. JC Midwest Assisted Public Works with Storm Debris Cleanup Decreasing the Time for Cleanup to be Completed
- Approved the 3rd Reading of Ordinance 2024-04 An Ordinance Amending the Code of Ordinances for the
 City of Windsor Heights, Iowa, by Amending Chapter 185, Governing Floodplain Management; and to Adopt
 and Publish. This ordinance will further assist in the City's flood management goals and help the City join
 the National Flood Insurance Program's Community Rating System. This is a voluntary program which can
 help communities get flood insurance discounts.

6/17/24 City Council Meeting Recap

- Mayor Mike Jones Proclaimed the Recognition of June 19, 2024 as Juneteenth National Freedom Day in Windsor Heights
- Approved a Space Use Analysis from OPN Architects. The analysis will look at all city facilities and assess
 the condition and space and programing needs. The City will be provided a report that includes a multi-year
 plan for improvements/changes, assessment of code compliance for existing buildings and preliminary cost
 estimates
- Approved the Street Tree Grant Program. The program will plant 20 trees in the fall on specified right of
 way properties and provide necessary watering for them. The program will be first come, first served. More
 details will be announced by mid-July
- Approved a Contract with JC Midwest Services for Public Works' Salt Shed Demolition. A new salt shed will be constructed this summer/fall
- Approved the Purchase of Fireworks for the Windsor Heights Fall Festival from J&M Displays
- Approved the 2024 Employee Handbook and Updated Purchase Policy which provides guidelines for city staff on what purchases will need Council approval
- Approved the 1st Reading of Ordinance No. 2024-05 An Ordinance Amending the Code of Ordinances for the City of Windsor Heights, Iowa, By
- Adding Chapter 182, Vacant Property Registration. The intention of this proposed Vacant Property
 Registration Ordinance is to establish a clear contact point and expectations for vacant property
 maintenance as well as to provide additional tools to the City to ensure vacant properties are free of exterior
 code violations and otherwise free of hazards
