Andy's Corner!

- The Winter Season is upon us. Please stay safe when traveling this winter. Be cautious and courteous especially when road conditions deteriorate. Our plow trucks start to clear streets with 1" or more of accumulation. Our crew starts by clearing the main roads throughout town first, and then they turn their focus onto the residential streets. For us to effectively clear the entire roadway network, please avoid parking on the street if the forecast calls for a winter weather event.
- The Salt Shed Improvement Project has wrapped up just in time for winter. This shed is vital to our winter operation and provides our staff with a safe and reliable storage facility of our salt inventory.



Road Construction Updates

The **73rd Street road reconstruction** is progressing, with the reopening to through traffic expected by mid-December 2024. Final work, including sidewalk paving and grass restoration, will be completed in Spring 2025. Future construction on 73rd Street will resume in Spring 2025, with the City collaborating with the contractor to prioritize project completion by the end of 2025, weather permitting. Meanwhile, the reconstruction of 68th Street, between University Avenue and School Street, is planned for 2025, with bidding set to begin this month. Additionally, design work for the **74th Street storm sewer improvements** and road reconstruction is underway. This project includes significant storm sewer upgrades along 74th Street and extending to North Walnut Creek, with the improvements tentatively scheduled for 2025 and road reconstruction likely to follow in 2026.



Stay Safe While Using Less Deicing Salt

Windsor Heights requires that you clear your sidewalks within 48 hours after the end of a snowfall. You'll find that it is more efficient to shovel right after, or even during, a snowfall.

Shoveling early and often is the best way to prevent snow compaction, making it easier to shovel and reducing the need for deicing salt. We want to avoid salt as it damages infrastructure and pollutes local water, but if you do need it, use it lightly only in icy spots. It only takes 1 cup of salt to treat 150 square feet if you did a good job of removing snow first. More salt does not mean faster melting.

Be aware that salt is not effective in super cold temperatures. In this case, skip the salt and use sand on icy spots to increase traction. Maintaining your property in the winter can be hard work. You are an important part of safety in your community! Protect your property from salt damage and your local waters from salt pollution by using less salt!

- Shovel early after snowfall to reduce snow compaction that creates ice. Just 1 set of footsteps creates compacted snow and more work!
- Use salt lightly only where needed. It is common to overapply deicing salt. Only a light spread in icy spots is necessary. The picture to the right is an example of too much salt.
- Use sand for traction when it's too cold for salt.

The bottom line: Physical removal is your first and best tool for preventing ice.

11/4/24 City Council Meeting Recap

- Approved Resolution No. 2024-66 A Resolution Waiving CC Fees for a Recurring Free-Will Donation Community Yoga Class. Beth Gookin attended and presented the concept to Council. The class will be hosted by Good Vibes Movement Yoga and will follow a concept of yoga classes held in Colby Park prior to the pandemic. Those of all yoga expertise levels will be welcome to join. The donations received for classes will be used to help those in need and compensate the class teacher for their time. Inquires about classes should be directed to Good Vibes Movement Yoga.
- Discussed the installation of a bridge over the bioswale in the Colby Park parking lot. The bridge would
 be installed by Bridges of Iowa, a long-term addiction treatment program founded in 2000 by Don and
 Charlene Lamberti. Dedicated to those without resources or prospects, Bridges has helped thousands of
 lowans and their families overcome drug and alcohol addiction and cross the bridge to a better life. The
 bridge would be in honor of the organizations 25th anniversary. Bridges of lowa would cover the cost of
 the bridge and maintenance for an agreed upon time. Council was supportive and City staff will continue
 conversations with Bridges of lowa.
- Approved Resolution No. 2024 65 A Resolution Approving The Site Plan For 6301 University Avenue Windsor Presbyterian Church Parking Lot.

11/18/24 City Council Meeting Recap

- Approved No Parking Signage on Wilshire Blvd at 74th and 75th. Public Works completed an assessment
 of potentially hazardous locations in the City and these intersections were identified as potentially unsafe.
 Public Works expects the signs to be installed by year end.
- Approved Resolution No. 2024-67 A Resolution Approving Charitable Donation Agreement of Real Estate.
 The land was donated by Immanuel Pathways and is 0.56 acres of land between the existing trail and
 Sherwood Forest. The property is currently in the process of being restored to prairie and native woods by
 the City and acceptance of this property donation will enable the City to maintain it in this state with a trail
 going forward.
- Discussed Colby Park table and bench options. Nate Weitl from Bolton and Menk, the City's engineering
 firm, presented 3 design options that used a mixture of a handicap accessible picnic tables and jessie rails,
 which are a stand-up counter style railing. Discussion centered on ensuring accessibility, avoiding areas
 of congestion, and maximizing seating areas. Staff will bring back a new design based on the feedback
 gathered at a future meeting.
- Discussed 68th Street Reconstruction and Sidewalk Accessibility. Discussion focused on whether to
 proceed with utilizing rubber matting to ensure residents with scooters and other mobility issues could
 safely travel along designated paths during construction. Council also discussed plans for designating ADA
 parking spots. Additionally, discussion took place on the projects alternative of reconstruction of Mott Ave
 between 68th and 69th Street. City staff recommended to construct sidewalk north of Mott which includes
 the removal of trees and relocating a resident's fence. Council was in favor of utilizing the rubber matting for
 a walkway and proceeding with the staff recommendation of the north sidewalk on Mott Ave.
