Andy's Corner!

- Two active road reconstruction projects are currently underway: 73rd St from University Ave to Hickman Road and 68th St. from School St. to University Ave.
- Road work is understandably inconvenient; however, the outcomes of these projects result in a much safer
 road network and provide for necessary improvements to the infrastructure above and below ground that will
 last a long time into the future. Please keep in mind that short-term pain is worth the long-term gain! Thank
 you for your support in these projects.
- Please join us on April 26th down at Colby Park for a Stream Clean-Up of Walnut Creek and an Earth Day Celebration.
- Reminder that the Storm Water Best Management Practices Program is available again this year. Windsor
 Heights is committed to increasing water quality and decreasing run-off which collect contaminates that
 eventually lead directly into our water ways. Visit the Public Works Department on the City's website for
 more information about the program and reimbursement rates.
- The Sidewalk Improvement Grant Program is also available. Each year, a portion of Windsor Heights' sidewalks are inspected for deficiencies. Sidewalks are an important part of making a community walkable and connecting neighbors. In order to make maintaining sidewalks more affordable, the City rolled out the Sidewalk Improvement Grant for up to 50% of the cost for necessary improvements.

Properties without existing sidewalks are not required to install sidewalks as part of City Ordinance.

73rd Street Reconstruction

Construction on 73rd Street in Windsor Heights is resuming as part of a multi-phase reconstruction project. Work includes pavement removal, grading, and sidewalk installations, affecting traffic patterns with road closures and detours. Stage 1A started March 17 while Stage 5 continues with improvements such as sodding after this stage completed reconstruction last fall.

Participate in Mow Less May

As a reminder, the City of Windsor Heights does not participate in No Mow May and will still enforce lawn codes all season long. Lawns must remain under 6" tall, and lawn clippings must be kept out of the street.

We do understand many residents want to do their part to create a habitat and food sources for pollinators, so here are a few alternatives to try this year!

- Participate in Mow Less May: Studies have shown that mowing every two weeks, as opposed to every week, can still significantly increase bee population size, and many flowering plants will flower even with mowing. Mowing grass at a taller height also promotes healthier lawns. Just be sure to set your mower height higher.
- Create a Pollinator Garden: Rather than letting your lawn grow high, install a pollinator garden.
 Pollinator gardens with a wide variety of species that bloom from early spring to late fall can help support bees, butterflies, and other beneficial pollinators all season long.

Staff will provide gloves, trash bags, grabbers, and support! Our staff routinely maintains Walnut Creek and North Walnut Creek along with The Windsor Trail which sits directly adjacent to the creeks. This past winter, we began some major forestry work along the creek by clearing overgrowth, invasive species, deadwood, and driftwood. This work results in a much healthier environment for desired species to thrive, not to mention a much safer experience for trail users. This work also helps manage and control potentially harmful debris in the floodway and allows us to plan for future projects related to bank stabilization and storm water initiatives. Windsor Heights Public Works takes pride in being able to provide an enjoyable and safe experience for all who use our facilities and visit our community.


Please join us in participating as we clean the streams and banks of trash, litter, and other refuse.

African American Museum of Iowa's Mapping Exclusion: Redlining in Iowa Exhibit - April 1-May 30 | Franklin Avenue Library

Join us at the Franklin Avenue Library for Mapping Exclusion: Redlining in Iowa. This exhibit from the African American Museum of Iowa explores the impact of housing discrimination and segregation in the state of Iowa. Redlining, the systematic denial of services by government agencies and the private sector to residents of specific neighborhoods, impacted black populations in seven Iowa cities: Cedar Rapids, Council Bluffs, Sioux City, Dubuque, Davenport, Des Moines, and Waterloo.

3/17/25 City Council Meeting Recap

- Chief Udell Mentola presented an update from Westcom, Windsor Heights' emergency dispatch provider.
- Held public hearing on the zoning code amendment of Chapter 175 regarding sign design elements and approved the first reading of the ordinance.
- Council discussed a proposal to improve safety at the intersection of 64th Street and Sunset near Cowles
 Montessori. The main issues are pedestrian safety during school pick-up and drop-off times, and parking
 violations. There were several options discussed to address the issues. Council approved additional no
 parking signs on the west side of 64th Street, painting crosswalks on 64th and Colby Ave as well as Sunset
 Terrace, non-flashing crosswalk signs, a school zone sign where appropriate, following up on the efforts in
 the summer months, and continued dialogue with school officials.

3/3/25 City Council Meeting Recap

- Held the public hearing for the FY26-36 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and subsequently approved the
- Approved the Site Plan at 6500 Hickman Road and directed staff to do further review on the parkland dedication condition of the site plan. Staff will have additional discussions with the property owner and return the condition to the council for approval.
- A motion to approve a professional services agreement for a 63rd Street monument, which would include
 designing and bidding the project, failed. There was concern regarding the cost of the monument being too
 high for the value added to the city.
